## FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Hi Everyone,  
 The end of the year is a busy time for schools, with a range of celebratory events on the calendar. The Senior Formal, Celebration of Success, Year 6 Graduation and Primary School Concert are all well attended events which couldn't run if not for the hard work of teachers, students and support staff. Thank you to everyone who supports these events, especially behind the scenes.

2022 started with a continuation of compulsory masks, social distancing and for many, periods of isolation and quarantine. There is no doubt that such disruptions had a negative impact on student learning. Moving into 2023 we have an opportunity to start a school year with more certainty than has been the case for a number of years. At Keith Area School, this will mean adjusting our Site Improvement Plan to ensure that we are taking all necessary steps to enhance student learning and improve student outcomes, especially in numeracy and reading.

One of the biggest changes that students, parents and teachers will adjust to in 2023 is the implementation of our school's new learner management system - Daymap. Daymap is the most comprehensive and flexible learning and teaching management system in Australia. It is used across the country in varying settings, from small country schools to large prestigious independent schools, from cloud hosted clusters of schools to distance and home education. For our teachers and administration staff, Daymap will streamline a number of administrative and operational processes to help them better manage the competing demands of their highly complex jobs. For parents, rollout of the Daymap Parent Portal in term will ensure that parents can:

- view student timetables and connect with teachers and office staff quickly and easily
- access assessment schedules and know exactly what summative tasks and homework students have to do
- see student results in real time, rather than waiting for reports at the end of every term and semester to know what grade their student is on

We will use the school holidays to fine-tune our knowledge of Daymap. Parent's will receive information about using the software at the beginning of the 2023 school year.

I would like to conclude by thanking everyone who has helped me out over the last three terms. When moving to Keith 12 months ago, I did not expect to be the Acting Principal so soon. The vast majority of the school community have been exceptionally supportive, giving me the space and advice required to starting learning about the complexities of the principalship on the job. I am very appreciative of your patience. In particular, I would like to thank the staff of Keith Area School. I have worked at a number of schools throughout my career and can say with confidence that KAS has one of the most outstanding teaching teams in South Australia. I am thoroughly looking forward to returning to the Deputy Principal's chair where I can continue working with you when Mr O'Connor returns in 2023.

## KNOCKOUT BASKETBALL

### Boys Knockout Basketball

The Year 9/10 Basketball Team, which was comprised mainly of Year 9 boys went to Naracoorte to play 3 games against Penola High School, Lucindale Area School and a practice game against Grant High School. Our first game was against the Penola team and a strong team effort saw us come away victors by just over 20 points. Travis W led the way with his scoring but it wasn't until Jed S started to open up the fast break game and score some easy baskets that eventually saw us break free and run away for an easy win. Others to do well were Tyson R and Bailey R. Our second game was against Grant High School who being a division above us, clearly gave the boys a 'touch up' with their ball skills and precise teamwork. Despite not really being able to get into the game, the boys still battled it out for some valuable practice and court time. Our final game was against Lucindale Area School and despite the scores being tight in the first half, the boys overcame their aching legs in the second half to again emerge the winners by just over 20 points. A special thanks go to Sally Hedges, Jordan Rehn and Levi Sigston for their efforts in representing our school with the umpires whistle and all the parents who willingly helped out with scoring on the day.

Our success at this meeting meant that we were off to Adelaide to play more matches. This is where we really met our match playing against mainly Year 10 boys teams. Most players had a 5 - 10 kg and 5 - 10 cm height advantage and some even showed their dunking skills. As a result, it was a strong time of learning against better teams. I was pleased how the boys rose to the occasions that they faced. All stepped up. Mitch G found out what strong defense and trash-talking was all about, yet did a superb effort guarding the better players of other teams. Tyson learned how to be stronger in the key at both ends of the court. Dusty W played some outstanding basketball against better guards but still led the scoring in most of the games. Jed found that running the break against more knowledgeable players is very difficult and so learned the importance of positioning in defense. Bailey and Jack H battled strongly in defense, always against taller opposition and by the end of the day had shown strong improvement in their knowledge of how to play against such players. A special mention to Travis W who was charged with ball carrying duties and learned how strong pressure could be when opposed by talented players. He held his head high and was our second most prolific scorer on the day. We had one win, which was a credit to the tenacity and fighting spirit of the boys. As a result we came sixth out of eight teams. Again we thank all the Keith contingent who came and supported the boys and thank those who provided the transport, scoring and umpiring requirements. A special thanks go to Mitch G, Jack H, Tyson R, Bailey R, Jed S, Dusty W and Travis W for their efforts in displaying strong sportsmanship on the court and representing our school with honour.

The girls also travelled to Naracoorte and played against the same 3 teams. Before the day began we were down two valuable players, Tillee J who unfortunately had a knee injury weeks before the tournaments began and sadly this certain 'starting five' player was ruled out. Also missing was Macy L who had a previous Adelaide appointment. Without these two regular starters, it fell on the bench players to step up and fill the gaps. And step up they did. Against Penola, the girls were 'switched on' from the start and quickly raced to a double digits lead and never looked back. Led superbly by Mia H's coolness in defence and Tahra's 'bring it on' special creativity in offense allowed Milly E to be given the role of fast-breaking in every game she played resulting in at least 10 points from her per game. We then had a 'practice' game against Grant High and after leading 'all day' lost by 2 pts in a thriller. Our final game was against Lucindale Area School where both teams struggled with tiredness and ball skills however, again, thanks to some strong offensive basketball, particularly from Della C and Milly's speed, the second half saw us reach a double digit lead which took us on to the next level of competition.

The success of this day saw us move on to Adelaide where we faced the task of playing four teams and needed to win against all four to be totally successful for the day. We received an early blow when Tahra D was ruled out due to illness and this left us with 6 players on the day. We welcomed back Macy and her bullocking work in the key at both ends of the court ensured that the pressure was kept on throughout all games. We began the day against Kadina who appeared physically stronger but apart from some poor ball handling errors early in the game, the team steadied under the strong leadership of Macy and Mia. Their good play released Milly on the break and allowed some constructive offensive play from Della C who found her range within the key for double digit points. A half an hour break and then it was Mt. Barker High School. It was tight early and although we held a 6 point buffer we couldn't capitalize on our good defensive work hampered by some poor shooting despite setting up well. Unfortunately near the end of the first half, we lost Mia H due to a bad knee injury leaving us with only 5 players for the rest of the game and indeed, the day. Once again, it was Milly's fast break running in the second half which broke the shackles and the team steadied to run away with a comfortable win.

And so it was on to our main contender, Balaklava, who had the luxury of a State Representative that was a class above the rest of the players on the court. Half time saw us ahead by 4 points only and the pressure was maintained for the first 5 minutes of the next half. However, it took two consecutive 'down town' three pointers from Anna M in the space of a minute to 'blow' the game right open. Hollie A then went to work under the boards at both ends of the court and with her 4 points to mark a 10 point run, all of a sudden the game was ours. Opposition was minimal and we ran away to a 28 - 11 point victory. This was a superb effort from a five player team who not only kept out of foul trouble but played the entire game without any substitutions. Our final game was against one of the weaker teams but it was still going to be decided on the fitness of this 5 player team. We started slowly, took a while to 'shake them off' but in the end all girls played well and we ran away for a comfortable win. This was the first time ever that Keith Area School had won a school's basketball competition and after 35 years of trying we became the official 'Statewide Schools Champions Basketball Year 9 - 10 Girls Division 3' winners for 2022. In this basketball team, every player had a responsibility and it was good to give all players plenty of court time and see them hone their skills under match conditions.

In conclusion, this was the best effort ever by a Keith Area School team in any Knockout Basketball Competition. These girls did everything that their skills would allow them to do and played some good competitive basketball. Furthermore, they attended all the practices and some went there thinking that they wouldn't see a lot of 'court time' in the finals but there were no complaints and the attitude and sportsmanship of the team was to be commended. So congratulations go to Hollie A, Della C, Tahra D, Milly E, Mia H, Macy L and Anna M. A special thankyou to all the mums (and Jamie Dick) who helped with transport and scoring during various games and especially Sarah Makin who organised all the administration paperwork and family notes. Parents, without your generosity with your time, we don't play (and in this case become champions). Thankyou!

Students and staff dressed up as their agricultural industry idol to recognise the variety of career pathways available in agriculture. Dress ups ranged from farmers, truck drivers, veterinarians, shearers and stock agents, recognising the diverse career paths available.



A Farmers Challenge activity was organised for the junior primary students at lunchtime, involving a speed shear, wheelbarrow races, and pinning the tail on the pig. The day culminated at lunch time where the Year 9 students prepared pork and gravy rolls consisting of pork they had raised earlier in the year. The pigs were sourced from Mount Boothby Pastoral, who supported the agricultural enterprise project.



Funds raised will be donated to the Royal Flying Doctors Service to support the medical care of rural South Australians. The students are proud that their volunteering project will culminate in a \$400 donation to the Royal Flying Doctors Service.

Getting to work with technology each and everyday.




## J1 Naracoorte Caves Excursion and Sleepover

On Friday the 25<sup>th</sup> of November, the Year Two class went to Naracoorte Caves. We went to the Fossil Cave, Stick Tomato Cave and the Fossil Centre. The Fossil Centre was my favourite. We saw fossils, stalagmites, stalactites and cracks in the roof. We also got to play on the Fossil Hunters Playground.

A long, long, long time ago back in the ice age the caves formed little holes in the roof that animals fell into. This is why there are so many fossils in the Victoria Fossil Cave. One of the animal bones that we saw was from the Short-Faced Kangaroo. In the Stick Tomato cave, a chemical reaction of water dripping into the cave, absorbed the carbon dioxide and become acidic. Instead of depositing calcite crystals, it dissolved the limestone to produce Avens. Due to the flowing air into the cave, the development of the avens has stopped. Forming a smooth surface on the roof.

After we got back to school, we got changed into our bathers and had water play on the front lawn. For tea we had sausages in bread, and an ice cream. We then got changed into PJ's and set up our beds for the night. We got to watch Sing 2. While we watched the movie, the teachers gave us popcorn and choc-chip cookies to eat. For breakfast Aaron cooked us all choc chip pancakes with cream.
