With the busy end of the term quickly approaching I ask that all readers keep up to date with events that may be occurring for their child/children- particularly our end of year celebrations. Like always, should you require any information please do not hesitate to contact your child's class teacher as a first contact.

Enjoy the warmer weather and longer days - until Week 8.
On Friday 3rd of November our Student Free Day had staff engaged in some in depth learning activities in preparation for the 2024 school year. PAT data was unpacked in session 1 with staff reviewing both the reading and maths data from tests undertaken earlier in Term 3. This was a great opportunity for staff to work in faculty areas and with like year level teachers to plan for student engagement in 2024. Our middle session of the day saw our primary staff working with our project officer Tamra Waye around the student misconceptions in mathematics and how staff can best support with our classroom intervention. Our primary team will be taking a different approach to math intervention next year and we are really excited to role this out in the new school year. Our secondary team worked with our secondary project officer Martin Gray around our Site Improvement Goal of writing. Staff delved deeper into the misconceptions in student writing and where lift is required. Several staff, both primary and secondary have reviewed a new writing scaffold which we are keen to implement in 2024 across Years 3-10. This scaffold was then shared to the secondary team and further work was done to support this implementation.

Our afternoon had staff working with one another to construct thorough learning and educational units for 2024 so that staff are sharing knowledge and resources across like year levels such as Year $5 / 6$ to Year $7 / 8$ teachers. This came from feedback from our External School Review (ESR) earlier in Term 3. By having strong collegial conversations, we can ensure we are entering into the new school year with consistency and with clear guidelines of what we expect from one another.

Our SSO's had some time to organise curriculum by supporting Mrs Rasheed with the drama room and its costumes and equipment. The middle session of the day was spent with the wonderful Jo Menz engaging in personal selfdevelopment and teamwork. Jo is a trained social worker, and we are lucky to have her in our school community supporting staff on these days.
Student Free Days are an important time for staff to engage in learning about our students so that we are continually reflecting and improving our teaching methodologies and pedagogies.

## RAP <br> PRESENTATION

In Week 2 the MFS Road Awareness Program came to Keith to present to our Year 10 and 11 students．Joel and Yudhi gave a powerful and emotional presentation about road safety and risk taking behaviour．

Joel was a firefighter and talked to the students about the statistics of road crashes per age group and the types of crash sites he has witnessed over the years．He also talked about the impact of road accidents on the firefighters，police，paramedics，family and friends of the person in the crash，let alone the impact of injuries and trauma on the person themselves．He also encouraged students to be active if they are a passenger in an unsafe driving situation－and to use positive peer pressure to discourage their mates from taking risks and making irresponsible decisions on the road．

Yudhi was a survivor of a car crash as a young man， with a young baby and a promising career ahead of him．His wife and baby came upon the crash site by chance and witnessed him on the side of the road being worked on by the paramedics．Yudhi shared his decades long story of being in a car crash，and the ongoing and debilitating impacts of his injuries on his life，his career， and his family to this day．His story was extremely impactful and had a powerful effect on our students．

We encourage families to have discussions at home about safe driving and being a responsible driver and passenger．Presentations like this are always a powerful reminder that a split second decision can have a lifelong impact．Feedback from students has highlighted the importance of these sessions to them as Learner drivers or P Plate drivers．

We have already booked in our session for 2024 and look forward to RAP coming back to Keith．

## WHAT IS LEGO LEAGUE?

FIRST® LEGO® League at KAS introduces science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) to children ages 9-16 through fun, exciting hands-on learning.
Participants gain real-world problem solving experience through a guided, global robotics program.

The program aims to inspire youth to experiment and grow their critical thinking, coding, and design skills through hands-on STEM learning and robotics.


This year our class had the opportunity attend careers camp. We started the camp early, arriving at school at 7:00. Departing at 7:30, we drove to Adelaide. First, we went to Flinders University. There we did an initial tour of the premises. From there we went into a workshop, rollercoaster construction. This required us to put our physics skills to the test to design and create the fastest rollercoaster. We then had lunch at the university and drove to flinders living. Holly Wilson, a former student at our school gave us a quick tour of the dorms and the living space. We then made our way to Tonsley Tafe where we walked through the workshop. There were many trades such as plumbing, electrical, painting, sign making, building, air conditioning and much more. This made us think of different jobs and careers we could choose to do. The tour guide then talked us through the many different ways that we could make use of TAFEsa, and how we could choose to do an apprenticeship with them as well. We then went to Belair National Park, where we spoke to a park ranger about his role and what they have to do to ensure that they keep all of the national parks safe and free of pests.

On the second day of the camp, we took a train into the CBD and went to the Defence Force Careers Recruiting Centre, where Dan gave us a talk on what happens and how you join the defence force and all the perks and benefits that come from it. From there we then did a scavenger hunt. Our task was to go around Adelaide with a booklet and take pictures and record all sorts of different things. The task was very enjoyable and the whole class had a blast. We then took a train down to the Adelaide Central Markets, where we got the chance to look around, but with an objective. The objective was to pretend you were and entrepreneur and think of a stall you would like to set up in there. We then pitched these ideas to Mr Wotton and Angela.

On the last day we stopped in Murray Bridge for lunch, and went to Moore Engineering and Mechanical, who showed us around their workshops. This was enjoyable for the whole class as we got to see how they make the fire trucks for the CFS, MFS, and the Parks and recreations team. They then gave us a demonstration on the trucks and all of the safety features that they have created to ensure that the truck is the safest it could be.

On behalf of the entire class, I would like to thank Mr Wotton and Angela for their tremendous efforts and for putting in all their hard work for making this camp a success.
