

It is a nationwide measure through which parents/carers, teachers, schools, education authorities, governments and the broader community can determine whether or not young Australians are developing the literacy and numeracy skills that provide the critical foundation for other learning and for their productive and rewarding participation in the community.

NAPLAN results allow parents/carers and educators to see how students are progressing in literacy and numeracy over time – individually, as part of their school community, and against national standards. #### 29th National Schools Constitutional Convention

Tuesday 19 - Thursday 21 March 2024

Time to reform Section 96 of the Constitution?
March 2024

From Tuesday 19 March to Thursday 21 March 2024 Chloe Cocks from Keith Area School (Open Access College) will be among 95 Year 11 and 12 students from around Australia attending the 29th National Schools Constitutional Convention (NSCC), being held at the Museum of Australian Democracy at Old Parliament House, Canberra. The program is funded by the Australian Government Department of Education (DOE), coordinated by National Curriculum Services (NCS) and supported by the Australian Curriculum Studies Association (ACSA) and department of education from all states and territories.



The topic for the 2024 Convention is, 'Section 96 of the Constitution allows the Commonwealth to grant funds to areas that fall outside those prescribed in Section 51. Should Section 96 be amended to decentralise the power of the Commonwealth?'. This topic will provide students with the opportunity to examine Sections 51 and 96 of the Australian Constitution and discuss if the power of the Commonwealth should be decentralised. A range of stimulus speakers will discuss the issues with students for them to debate with all delegates.

Outcomes from the Convention will be incorporated into a Communiqué that will be forwarded to the President of the Senate, Senator Sue Lines, for tabling in Parliament and recorded in Hansard.

As a national delegate Chloe will travel with 11 other students from their state or territory.

Other elements of the program will include the Prime Minister's Reception at Parliament House, a meeting with the Governor-General, The Honourable David Hurley AC DSC (Retd) at Government House, and an official dinner at the National Press Club.

### LIONS YOUTH OF THE YEAR

They wrote, researched, rehearsed, and delivered their speeches utilising their own styles, but all with fantastic success. #### **Student Topics:**

Macy L – Aligning with something that is of personal relevance to Macy, she discussed the importance of road safety from the perspective of a typically stereotyped group. She uitilsed statistics about the topic, as well as encouraging the audience to consider their own personal experience on our roads.

Mia H – Mia explored the importance of rural hospitals in local communities. Aligning with one of Mia's passions, she delivered a thought-provoking speech about the importance of rural hospitals within local communities. She explored this topic through both a factual and anecdotal lense.

Sara R – Sara drew much needed attention to funding in the Foster Care System. Aligning with something that has played a large role in her life, Sara delivered an empowered speech about the funding, or lack thereof, within the Foster Care System. She advocated for change in the system for the benefit of all involved.





Chloe W – Chloe discussed the difference in opportunities for city and country kids. Chloe delivered a brilliant speech about the contrast in opportunities for both city and country kids. She will focus specifically on educational and social differences.

Chloe C – Chloe produced a speech focusing on mental health within society. She explored the importance of being open and transparent about mental health, whilst exploring the negative impacts that can come through a lack of mental health awareness.

Claire S – Claire discussed how the actions of customers can impact the mental health of hospitality workers. Using her experience of working in the Hospitality Industry, Claire delivered a speech to make us consider the way in which we treat workers in the industry.

As you can see, the topics were extremely broad and related to student interest. Each of them did a fantastic job at sharing their experiences and beliefs about these topics.

We celebrated Harmony Week with a whole school picnic. All students and staff members participated in outdoor games and the Junior Primary students performed a Harmony Day song and dance.



















### PORT NOARLUNGA EXCURSION


#### **SRC FORMATION DAY**



It started in Australia about 75 years ago and our Lions club of was formed in 1968.

The Lions clubs motto "WE SERVE" concisely explains the aim of clubs to help in so many areas, be they disasters, humanitarian, medical-skin cancer screening or prostate research- and local youth programs.

One of the earlier programs, eye health started in 1925 to assist Hellen Keller ( a blind woman) and then spread throughout the world with several programs. One of which Keith Lions support, namely the collection of used glasses, spectacles, and hearing aides which are forwarded to a Lions facility in Queensland, where they cleaned, "classed"graded before being sent overseas to PNG and Pacific areas.

Some years ago we had the slogan "Lions, so much more than sausages and BBQs". Whilst the local Lions are in a sound financial position, own their own club rooms, they could be so much more with a few new members. Younger (not hard) with digital experience (more than a raised finger) and an evening out of the gender imbalance, would mean the club could do so much more. For instance are you aware the Lions club could provide a simple early childhood vision screening program, to pick up the one in five children who have vision problems that may effect their early childhood development.
